Talk: "The Giant Willow Aphid and Its Environmental Impact"


The giant willow aphid (GWA), *Tuberolachnus salignus*, is an invasive pest species first recorded in New Zealand in 2013. Since then, it has spread rapidly, affecting over 50 species and hybrids of willow and poplar throughout the country. These trees and shrubs have high agricultural importance as forage, to stabilize slopes and riverbanks, to prevent soil erosion, and as sources of nectar and pollen for bees.

The GWA affects its surroundings in multiple ways, not only by reducing plant vigour, but by releasing copious amounts of honeydew that promotes the growth of sooty mould, attracts unwanted insects (such as *Vespula* wasps, ants, and flies), causes bee honey to crystalise (affecting apiculture), and alters soil composition and habitat.

Due to the extent of the invasion, eradication is no longer feasible, so there is a need to assess the environmental impact of this pest species in NZ and develop sustainable control strategies to mitigate it.

EXPLORE THE BUSH AND WETLANDS AT ASHHURST DOMAIN AND
LEARN ABOUT THE HISTORY OF THE DOMAIN



The Ashhurst Domain offers a network of walking tracks made up of several loops over a flat terrace area with moderate to steep slopes leading to the Manawatu River, where you can discover lush natural surrounds echoing with rich birdsong in one of the Regions last remnants of native bush. The upper circuits offer revealing views overlooking conservation wetlands, while others guide you through native bush

The site where the wetlands stand (a series of lagoon-like bodies, connected by a small stream to the Pohangina River), was once actually the course of the river itself. The course of the river changed when an embankment was constructed alongside the railway between Palmerston North and Gisborne, sometime after 1872. Whether it is a "restored" wetland in the true sense of the word or not, it is today the habitat of rich birdlife and the rare mudfish. Its restoration has been the result of community groups and local and regional government efforts over the years; undertaking fencing, pest control and riparian planting.

Knowing its environmental and cultural history, should only enrich its value and enjoyment.

Talk: What are the implications of gene editing technology for New Zealand?

**Speaker**: Professor Barry Scott Massey University


Barry Scott is Professor of Molecular Genetics at Massey University. His research focuses on understanding the molecular basis of agriculturally beneficial symbiotic interactions between plants and microbes.

**Synopsis**: The revolution in gene editing technologies is making it easier to make targeted changes in the genomes of animals, plants and microorganisms. The development of these new technologies has huge potential benefits in many sectors including healthcare, agriculture and conservation. However, the technology to carry out gene editing and the ideas about how it might be applied are, in many cases, moving well ahead of public understanding and consideration of the proposed changes, and any consensus on how this technology might be used.

To explore the implications of gene editing technology for New Zealand, the Royal Society Te Apārangi convened a multidisciplinary panel of experts, supported by a Māori reference group, to consider the social, cultural, legal and economic implications of gene-editing technologies for New Zealand.

Nature Calls is investigating the full range of options for managing, treating and discharging Palmerston North's wastewater. There are a few things we need to consider: how and where we DISCHARGE **Zero Carbon Bill** wastewater, how we TREAT wastewater, and where the treatment plant is located.

## Submissions close 16 July, 2019

The Zero Carbon Bill, formally known as the Climate Change Response (Zero Carbon) Amendment Bill, was read a first time in Parliament on 21 May 2019 and referred to the Environment Committee. The Bill was supported in its first reading by all Political Parties except ACT. The bill proposes to place a set of greenhouse gas reduction targets into law and require that future governments continue these efforts into the future.
