F&B Manawatū February 2021 Monthly Trip Saturday 27th February, 2021

Rangitikei Reserves

WHERE: Pryces Rahui, and Sutherland's Mangahoe, Rangitikei

F&B Rangitikei Branch looks after 6 Reserves and they have offered to guide us around two of them.

Pryces Rahui: Located on a fluvial terrace of the Rangitikei River, the reserve is dominated by kahikatea, with some rimu and matai emerging over a mixed broadleaf canopy.

Sutherland's Mangahoe: Located south of a volcanic plateau and to the west of the foothills of the Ruahine Ranges, the 12-hectare Sutherland Mangahoe Reserve is made up primarily of Kahikatea podocarp forest - Kahikatea forest with rimu, totara, rewarewa, and occasional matai and miro, over an understorey of tawa. The North West corner of the reserve contains an area of immature Kahikatea forest 20m tall, which is so dense that the tops bang together in wind. The thinking is that the area was a large subsidence which destroyed the original forest, and this new stand is fighting for dominance.

Public consultation to occur in 2021

The MCA process is helping us narrow down the options and enables Council to bring selected options to you for consideration in a second round of public

consultation in early 2021.

Later next year, Council will choose the best practicable option to proceed with. Once that decision is made, a resource consent application will be prepared and lodged before June 2022.

This process must continue, despite recent developments with the government's Three Waters Reform and the consideration of a new agency or regional agencies that would take control of drinking water and wastewater. As nothing has been confirmed, nor timeframes set, we need to continue to work on our resource consent application to ensure we meet our legal obligations.

KiwiRail regional freight hub

KiwiRail is proposing to develop a freight hub near Bunnythorpe. Find out more about this project, what Council's role is, and opportunities for you to provide feedback.

Notice of Requirement and supporting information

KiwiRail has lodged a Notice of Requirement to designate land for the construction and operation of a new intermodal rail and freight hub. Council officers have reviewed the Notice of Requirement and identified a number of areas where more information is needed to understand the effects of the proposal.

We issued a further information request to KiwiRail on 14 December, which you can read here: s92 letter: Request for further information (1.3MB pdf)

The next step is for KiwiRail to consider the request and collate any responses it wishes to make. We anticipate a response in the new year.


KiwiRail has asked for the Notice of Requirement to be publicly notified. This will happen after it has responded to the request for further information. Notification is likely to happen in February/March 2021. In the meantime, you can access the notice and supporting information below, or view hard copies at the following locations: Ashhurst Library, Bunnythorpe School, Feilding Library, Palmerston North Central Library, and the Palmerston North City Council customer service centre.
