Speakers: Tom Kay, F&B Fresh Water Advocate and Professor Ian Fuller, Physical Geography, Massey University

Professor Ian Fuller will give a short presentation about the science behind Tom's talk.

Tom will be talking about how the way we have managed our environment has exacerbated flooding and disaster risk, the impact of flood protection engineering on our rivers and communities, and the approach we could be taking instead.

Constraining rivers changes their natural form, reduces groundwater recharge, and destroys wetlands and other habitat for native fish and birds. Numerous rivers across Aotearoa have been straightened and constrained, with thousands of hectares of river and wetland habitat destroyed in the process.

Making room for rivers allows the land adjacent to rivers to flood safely, while providing for a whole range of other benefits such as riparian planting, wetland restoration and carbon sequestration, increased groundwater recharge, river habitat restoration for native fish and birds, and more recreation opportunities for people.

Is it time to redefine conservation in Aotearoa? What will it take for decision-makers to take climate and biodiversity seriously? How are our rangatahi going to change the world?


