The future of conservation | Wed 27 March 2024, 7:30pm - 8:30pm | online

This webinar will explore the future of conservation from three different perspectives. Michael Bunce, the Chief Science Advisor at the Department of Conservation will talk about the future of conservation in terms of advances in technology. FAREWELL TO THE BIRDS



Members of the Manawatu Estuary Trust extend a welcome to everyone to the Estuary at the Manawatu Heads as a gesture of farewell to acknowledge the departing migratory birds.

DATE: Saturday, 16th March 2024

TIME: 3.30pm

WHERE: We will be meeting at the viewing platform, Dawick Street (off Seabury Avenue), Foxton Beach)

Associate Professor Phil Battley, Massey University/BirdNZ will be there to help identify birds

Within four days of 16th March 2024, the Autumn equinox will be here. It's also the time for the annual event of Hekenga.

" Ko te hekenga nui o nga manu"

It is the great journey of the birds

Migration of some of the wading birds will have been going on for about two weeks. No one can tell if or when the birds are ready to make their departure from the estuary in small flocks. We can only observe their agitation and hear their calls signalling their preparation for the event. Departures usually occur, weather dependent. later in the afternoon.

The Bar tailed godwits, Kuaka, depart to return to Alaska to breed. The lesser or red knot, Huahou, another summer visitor, will return to breeding grounds in Siberia.

The sandspit is also a gathering area for the wrybill, one of the threatened native species that relies on the Manawatu estuary as a feeding ground. These little fellows can be

spotted easily using the spotting scopes which will be made available. There is a good chance that you may see a flock of these special birds at this time.

Viewing and photographic opportunities present themselves uniquely well because of the access and close proximity to their gathering points.

VEHICLES ON BEACHES



Forest & Bird have recently investigated all the vehicles on beaches regulations of each coastal city, district and unitary council in NZ, and ranked them. It is unacceptable that 73 percent (just over two-thirds) have inadequate bylaws, monitoring, and compliance for vehicles on beaches, which means coastal species and the environments they live in are left vulnerable and unprotected.
